Houston has so many incredible horticultural organizations manned by very generous members, all volunteers, who make this city a much more pleasurable place to live. It isn't often that I have the opportunity to say THANKS! But here comes one and I'm going to grab it.

The River Oaks Garden Club is celebrating its 82nd Annual Azalea Trail March 10, 11 & 12. Four River Oaks homes and gardens (illustrations above and below) will be open for public viewing along with Bayou Bend, Rienzi and the Forum of Civics Building. Azaleas are peaking so this should be one spectacular show.

The ticket charge is what I'd like to focus on right now. See what I mean? I'm so glad I have this opportunity to thank these folks!





## SEEDS VS. STARTER PLANTS

Interesting email came in from Louise L, who was inspired by Jill Carroll's great gardening article in the Sat., Feb. 18 Houston Chronicle:

**"Try skipping the transplants and growing from seed."**

The Chron.com online version (the link above) has the full article, but you'll miss the beautiful colorful layout which, unfortunately, only subscribers can see. I loved the way Jill admits: "*Transplants are a great choice if you want to 'get 'er done' in a hurry.*" Her article, she says, is for those who want to take gardening "to the next level." That's a great way to put it.

Louise wrote that, since moving to Houston from New Jersey, she used started plants because her neighbors did. In New Jersey, she had used mainly seeds. Now that she's retired, she wants to get back into seeds. Why, she writes, are starter plants used mostly down here? What are the advantages and disadvantages of each approach?

Climate's the biggest reason, Louise. Many seeds require a slow germination period to reach full potential. Our soil heats up so quickly in spring (almost never even gets cool nowadays) that some seeds germinate too quickly. Up north they plant wildflower seed in spring, for example. We plant most wildflower seed in November & December. Ditto for bulbs. At least that way they get a little "cool" soil that slows down the process, allowing germinating seeds to mature more efficiently.

Seeds are more work, but also allow for a far broader selection of varieties. And are more fun to watch! At the same time, with seeds you have to be far more careful than you do with already-started plants from a nursery. Seeds are usually packaged in other climates and labeled with cold-tolerance zones which may be misleading for us. We need HEAT-tolerant zone info, which is available but not often listed on packets.

If a nursery wants your repeat business (as most locally-owned nurseries do!), they will do the advance selection for you. The already-started varieties you buy at a local independent nursery will most likely been grown by local area growers who know well our subtropical pocket benefits and challenges.

Still confused? Check our calendar below. The list of free lectures (and a few that charge) focusing now on spring planting is amazingly widespread throughout the Greater Houston area.

But be aware that what works well in Montgomery County, for example, may not be the best choice for Galveston County gardeners. Most Master Gardeners in our 8+ county area have extensive demonstration gardens with labeled flowers, shrubs, vegetables, fruit trees, etc. Master Gardeners are based at your county AgriLife Extension Center. You can find locations at [counties.agrilife.org/](http://counties.agrilife.org/).

Becoming a Harris County MG was the best money I ever spent on my garden. Think about becoming one!

Back to Louise's other question: "Is it worth it to try some of those seeds sold in packets just about everywhere?" Sure! Seeds are inexpensive and great fun. You might google the name of the plant and "Houston garden" to see what local writers have said about when and where to plant specific ones.

Or, just give it a try, keeping in mind Nature always bats last!

I also loved the way Jill ended her article (*forgive me Jill for perhaps quoting too much? But you're good!*):

*"Growing from seeds gives us gardeners the chance to develop a special relationship with our plants. Also, we gain a sense of self-sufficiency and accomplishment when we relish the gaudy blooms and harvest the plump vegetables from what began as tiny, hard little dots. So much life, energy and potential exists deep inside those little specks!"*

It's worth it to me to subscribe to the Chronicle to see the gorgeous layouts and read Jill's prose.




## JOHN'S CORNER

### BOOK REVIEW



Last Friday I was at the organic horticulture seminar put on by the Microlife Family of Products, where Jeff Lowenfels was the featured speaker. Every serious gardener knows Jeff from his two previous books "Teaming With Microbes" and "Teaming With Nutrients", which should be in everyone's library of gardening books.

At the seminar, I was able to attain Jeff's newest book "Teaming With Fungi", hot off the presses as it was just released on January 25, 2017. Being the bookworm I am, I finished reading it this morning. Jeff has done it again with another great book that explains the very technical complex world of mycology (the study of fungus) in common language for every gardener to understand.



As we continue to learn more and more about the benefits of organic methods, fungi are critical to gardening success. Fungi are a major player in the soil food web that makes plants grow strong and healthy without the need for expensive toxic chemicals.

Jeff clearly explains how fungi can improve drought resistance, diseases resistance, and collect nutrients required for growth. He explains that beneficial fungi can make or break a plants success in our gardens.

From the book: " *Teaming with Fungi* is an important guide to mycorrhizae and the role they play in agriculture, horticulture, and hydroponics. Almost every plant in a garden forms a relationship with fungi, and many plants would not exist without their fungal partners. By better understanding this relationship, gardeners can take advantage of the benefits of fungi, which include an increased uptake in nutrients, resistance to drought, earlier fruiting, and more. Learn how the fungi interact with plants and how to best to employ them in your home garden."

The first chapter covers a lot of terminology to be technically accurate for those that like to be precise. For most gardeners I would not worry about the language and terminology but focus on understanding the role fungi play in our gardens and the environment that help us have beautiful plants.
