# POLLINATORS — WE CAN'T LIVE WITHOUT THEM

"Go to your fields and your gardens, and you shall learn that it is the pleasure of the bee to gather honey of the flower, But it is also the pleasure of the flower to yield its honey to the bee. For to the bee a flower is a fountain of life, and to the flower a bee is a messenger of love. And to both, bee and flower, the giving and the receiving of pleasure is a need and an ecstasy"

Tithonia, above, is one of my favorite flowers. It's so happy, so visible from across the yard and now -- its most valuable attribute -- it's an incredible triple-pollinator attractor bees, butterflies and hummingbirds. Pretty neat, eh?

Pollinator — Talk about a word that has tsunami'd its way into our vocabulary, - starting with the honeybee's decline from Colony Collapse Disorder. Now every school child probably knows more about pollinators than most adults do. They're part of every curriculum.

Pollinators are insects, animals, etc., that assist plants with reproduction: bats, butterflies, moths, flies, birds, beetles, ants and bees. The Simple Truth is: We Can't Live Without Them. Over 80% of Earth's flowering plants require pollinators to survive.

Think about it. Without pollinators, neither we, nor any of Earth's terrestrial ecosystems, would survive.

Study after study now reflects global declines in so many important pollinators for a variety of reasons, not the least of which is negative human intervention into their habitats. On the other hand, actual marked decreases in decline rates have been noted, as in the case of monarch butterflies.

How much do our habitat gardens help? While there are no definitive stats out yet, they certainly can't hurt.

Below is a random email survey\* of area public gardens, flower laden nurseries and other area resources. I asked for a list of flowering plants that attract the most onsite hummingbirds & butterflies. Of course, nonblooming plants are very important as well. But just focusing on flowering plants today.

Remember, I asked them to list those flowers that immediately come to mind as being the ones on which they usually see the MOST pollinators. I'm listing them all, even duplicates, so you'll know where to see/buy them in your specific area. I listed everyone who responded to my request.

- Butterflies Native lantana (Lantana urticoides); mistflowers (Conoclinium sp.); beebalms (Monarda sp.); buttonbush (Cephalanthus occidentalis); gayfeathers (Liatris sp.); basketflower (Centaurea americana)
- Hummingbirds Turks cap (Malvaviscus arboreus); trumpet creeper (Campsis radicans); scarlet sage (Salvia coccinea); cardinal flower (Lobelia cardinalis); coral honeysuckle (Lonicera sempevirens)

- **Butterflies** Tithonia; purple coneflower; various eupatoriums; Asclepias curassavica. Swallowtails really like Mexican orchid tree (*Bauhinia mexicana*) and buttonbush.

Bees are a must for a healthy garden. Our gardeners extraordinaire recommend -to attract bees -- I to r, bulbine, 'pink cuphea, Mexican heather and African Blue' and
'Purple Ruffles' basil.

**SO, WHICH PLANTS ATTRACT POLLINATOR** at Mercer Botanic Garden? Staffers list these as their Top 5 Blooming PollinatorAttracting Plants:











- Echinacea purpurea (purple coneflowers) beloved by all bugs & butterflies; can bloom almost all year
- 2. Solidago canadensis (goldenrod) fabulous in autumn; covered by bees and all sorts of critters.
- 3. Conoclinium coelestinum (mist flower) fabulous in autumn
- 4. Salvias (sages) great tubular flowers for nectar and pollen
- 5. Senna alata (candlestick plant) host plant of cloudless sulfur, orangebarred sulfur, and large orange sulfur butterflies

In addition to flowers listed above, Mercer staffers add these as musthave pollinators for home gardens:

- Verbena "Homestead" for butterflies
- Lion's Tail (Leonotis leonurus) for hummers
- Firebush (or hummingbird bush / Hamelia patens) for hummers, butterflies & bees

And, since I neglected to ask some of the above folks for their bee-attractors (a MUST for flowers in general), Mercer folks graciously also send a list

specifically to attract bees: Mealycup sage (Salvia farinacea 'Henry Duelberg'), Gulf Coast penstemon (Penstemon tenuis); cigar plant, batface cuphea, beebalm, almond verbena, cosmos, buttonbush, false indigo, clasping leaf coneflower and blue mistflower.

And a treat from John Ferguson: look at the bees on this coralvine!

# **BOOK REVIEW**


THE MAGNESIUM MIRACLE –
Discover The Missing Link to Total
Health, 2<sup>nd</sup> Edition, by Carolyn
Dean, M.D., N.D., Ballantine Books,

2017, ISBN: 978-0-399-59444-1

Back in August I attended the allday gardening workshop sponsored by OHBA. One of the speakers Mila McManus, M.D., a functional medicine doctor whom focuses on prevention of health issues, rather than treating symptoms like most doctors.

She gave a very good talk on nutrition and health, titled "Top 10 Disease Causes". Note: She also authored a book titled "Highway to Health" which can be found at woodlandswellnessmd.com

During her talk she mentioned the element magnesium (Mg) several times as essential to human health and recommended the book above, as 90% of our population are very deficient in this essential

element. During our study of the 79 elements in the human body a while back we discussed magnesium quite a bit, from soils to crop flavor, to disease and pest resistance.

This book *really goes into the details of why and how*magnesium promotes our health! It is written in a non-technical format that most folks can understand.

It starts off with causes of magnesium deficiency, a list of 26 major things. Of course, fluoride in water systems and toothpaste are one of the large causes of this deficiency. The author then goes on to explain in detail over 41 health problems caused by magnesium deficiency. Then 100 other factors that are related to the deficiency and may contribute.

She then explains how each of these factors work to harm our health. For example, I will use fluoride, since we have discussed the damage it does several times, from soil to plants to human health. The element fluorine (FI) combines with magnesium (Mg) to form the mineral sellaite (MgF<sub>2</sub>) which is very brittle. It is absorbed into our tissues like bone and cartilage which then makes the bones brittle and subject to fracture.

A lack of magnesium also prevents vitamin-D from working properly and preventing disease as we have learned from all the covid research the last couple of years.

She also reviews that deficiency in our soils, leads to deficiency in animals and humans. This is aggravated by using glyphosate (herbicides like Round Up) or eating foods like GMO's which are saturated with this toxic chemical, that prevent the absorption of what little magnesium was present!

The doctor covers sleep and depression issues caused by deficiency, to

restless legs and heart issues and many more health issues linked to magnesium deficiency.

From our study of magnesium, it is the 4th most abundant mineral in the human body and more than 300 enzymes require magnesium to function properly.

This book is over 500 pages on the importance of magnesium and how a lack hurts our health.
