SAVE OUR LADYBUGS! . . . PLANTING BY HOLIDAYS HELPFUL . . . AS LONG AS YOU BREAK TO PRUNE THE ROSES

"Why don't we plant bulbs on Valentine's Day? Because . . . "

Now, back to our regularly scheduled musings . . . When it comes to enjoying blooms of bulbs, do you "Plant by the Holidays"?

I recently quoted my late friend Sally McQueen Squire's favorite garden club lectures, "**Bare Bones Landscaping**." Now, quoting her again! She was, after all, best known as Houston's Bulb Lady.

Two readers, Josey Malone in Magnolia and Janet asked about the chances of getting tulips to rebloom here. Both ladies wondered if they could dig up tulips, post blooming, store them over summer, re-refrigerate them 4-6 weeks in fall and plant again for another spring bloom cycle?

If anyone could figure out how to rebloom tulips here, it would have been Sally. Tulips, her most favorite, were stars of our longtime "bulb bible, Sally's **"The Gardener's Complete Guide to Growing Bulbs on the Gulf Coast"** (available on Amazon). A prime mover in the Garden Club of Houston's Bulb & Plant Mart, she and made many trips to Amsterdam (bulb heaven). But even she could never do get tulips to rebloom.

Tulips need slow, prolonged winter soil cooling and slow spring soil re-heating, not our roller coaster temperatures. Also true for muscari, crocus and, usually, hyacinths (may rebloom once, don't count on it). We compensate for slow winter cooling by refrigerating 4-6 weeks. But then two factors doom reblooming:

- our artificial way of cooling saps a lot of strength out of bulbs.
- there is no way to replicate gradual spring soil warming bulbs need to replenish for future blooms.

But, hey, it never hurts to try! Dig them up. Stick some in refrigerator in October. See what happens! If they do rebloom, they probably will "blast" (very short stems so flowers appear at the base of the plant).

One of Sally's favorite lecture flyers was ***Planting by the Holidays***. Ironically, it ties in (sort of) with today's Spotlight article by Baxter Williams on pruning roses (below). How? Keep reading and you'll see:

SALLY'S PLANTING GUIDE:

PRESIDENTS DAY - FEB. 20: Start caladiums inside; plant on Easter. (May rot if put too early in too-cool soil). Plant alstromeria quickly. (Soil may already be too warm.) Stagger gladiolus planting at two-week intervals to produce a longer season of color.

ST. PATRICK'S DAY - MAR. 17: Oxalis (4-leaf clovers sold in grocery stores are perennials here). Start dahlias but be patient. These often require one full growing season before producing flowers.

EASTER SUNDAY - APRIL 16: Plant amaryllis and caladiums in ground now. Caladiums seldom winter over. Amaryllis do naturalize and are extremely hardy. No need to lift.

MOTHER'S DAY - MAY 14: Plant achimenes. Plant crinums and canna any time except dead of winter.

MEMORIAL DAY - MAY 29: Okay to plant caladiums this late, but use already-started plants.

LABOR DAY - SEPT. 4: Till bulb planting areas, add organic matter. Get October [Garden Club of Houston's Bulb & Plant Mart](#) on your calendar. Best selections of good-for-us bulbs. Best bulb planting time ahead!

COLUMBUS DAY - OCT. 9: Add dirt to bulb beds if the soil has settled. Start amaryllis in containers indoor so they will bloom for the holidays. Afterwards, plant in the garden, in a raised area, in the spring.

HALLOWEEN - OCT. 31: Plant agapanthus, allium, anemone, bletilla, lycoris, ranunculus (claws down!), crocus, Dutch iris, freesia, leucojum, milla, muscari, sparaxis & watsonia. (No daffs, tulips, hyacinths yet)

VETERANS DAY - NOV 11: Start 'Paperwhite' narcissus in shallow dishes filled with pebbles for holiday blooms. Continue planting additional bowls every two weeks, to extend blooming season. Refrigerate tulip bulbs 4-6 weeks before planting.

THANKSGIVING - NOV. 23: Plant daffodils and pre-refrigerated hyacinths in the ground. Unchilled hyacinths can be planted anytime in hyacinth glasses or containers and refrigerated until the roots fill the glass. Start amaryllis bulbs in pots in a low-light area for holiday blooms.

NEW YEAR'S EVE - DEC. 31: Plant 4-6 weeks refrigerated (only) tulips. Plant at 2-week intervals for longer bloom season. Tulips can be planted anytime until Feb. 13.

VALENTINE'S DAY - FEB. 14 -- AND WHY CAN'T YOU PLANT TULIPS ON VALENTINE'S DAY?

Because, said Sally, Valentine's Day is the traditional day for pruning roses in the garden!

The Houston Rose Society, the largest rose society in the nation, agrees.

That's why the Bayou City's top Rosarians annually invite all gardeners to a **Rose Pruning Done Right Workshop**. This year (because of the Super Bowl) the workshop will be held in a different spot:

And now, back to roses.

In our Spotlight, below, Rosarians Extraordinaire Baxter Williams gives us a preview of advice that will be given during the workshop, including common pruning mistakes that even, they admit, experts often make.

Don't you love it when experts admit even they make mistakes? Master Rosarian James Laperouse, for example, added this personal confessions to Baxter's wonderful list of "DON'T DOs" below:

"I used to use the wrong orientation of the pruners. That is to say, instead of having the sharp side of the by-pass pruner or lopper oriented to where the sharp edge is facing the part of the cane that is going to be left on the plant, I cut with the blunt edge down. Wrong! That would crush that part and would usually cause stem or cane die-back.

Also, in those "olden days", when I was in a rush, I was careless about placement of the pruners and would sometimes cut through the bud eye I was trying to keep on the plant. Then I would have to try to find another outward facing bud eye further down the cane -- always a struggle to do so!"

EVEN SEASONED ROSE GARDENERS MAKE PRUNING MISTAKES . . .

"Even seasoned rose gardeners make pruning mistakes, albeit few. Here are the likely ones.

1. Using unsharpened shears. Sharp shears are MUCH easier to use, and do less harm to the remaining canes.
2. Leaving more than 1/4-inch above the selected node, which excess will likely result in dieback. Actually, 1/8-inch is better.
3. Cutting to a small diameter stem. If you want the new growth to be strong enough to support a large stem and bloom, you should cut to a pencil-sized stem or larger; smaller ones cause smaller, weaker stems, and smaller blooms.
4. Leaving cane stubs at the bud union where a cane has been removed. Cuts at the bud union should always be flush with the surface.
5. Forgetting to protect your just-pruned rose bush against fungus diseases.
6. Leaving diseased (black-spotted) leaves on the bush. The fungus spores on those leaflets will spread to others on that bush, and to adjacent bushes, and to neighbors' bushes.
7. Listening to false advice, such as always disinfecting after each cut, and making each cut at a 45-degree angle.
8. Forgetting to have fun while doing the work."
